Background: The outreach event will examine *Climate Change in the Pacific Islands* grappling with impacts of sea level rise, the ocean and climate change nexus, and disaster risk to explore solutions in the context of migration, governance, diplomacy and law etc. The outreach event will host Pacific and IPCC experts to provide bridge between global and Pacific understanding of climate change impacts.

The event will address insights gained from the First Lead Author's Meeting for the Special Report on the Ocean and Cryosphere in a Change Climate, taking place in Nadi on 2-6 Oct, 2017 and the IPCC Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5 °C , and the Sixth Assessment Report. The event provides a platform for supporting Pacific voices in the IPCC processes to ensure local and regional engagement. An information session is available for researchers and potential authors.

Objectives: The main objective is to present the future activities of the IPCC from 2016 to 2022 and the production of the Sixth Assessment Report (AR6), as well as the Fifth Assessment Report (AR5) findings, how they are being manifested in Fiji and the region and the potential solutions. The event is held in cooperation with the host institution to provide a local perspective. The **event will aim to:**

- Raise awareness, especially among policymakers and the scientific community from the region, about the AR6 cycle workplan and priorities of the IPCC.
- Enlist the participation of the local science and research community in climate research and encourage regional contribution to the AR6 cycle by providing information on the IPCC processes.
- Raise awareness, especially among policymakers, about the outcomes of the AR5 demonstrate how they are and will affect the region and highlight solutions to the challenges of climate change.
- Foster a better understanding among the news media about climate science, solutions to climate change and the IPCC process.
- Present the IPCC role, activities and main findings to civil society and business sector representatives, students and youth groups whenever possible.
